



MURDER DOCKET OPENED

indicating that the cause of death of the deceased body found near Sedgefield Rivermouth on Monday, 10 July, has now been listed as Murder. The victim has been identified as Johannes Le Roux (61).

As reported in last edition of The EDGE, it was initially believed that the man had perished from exposure to the elements after his decomposing body was discovered near a cave above the river mouth beach by a passer-by on a morning walk.

The walker reported his finding to the authorities who immediately dispatched officers to the scene. According to Sergeant Chris Spies of SAPS WC Media:- "Police found the body concealed under branches.

SAPS has issued a statement It was later established that the victim sustained stab wounds to the back and shoulder, and head injuries believed to be inflicted with a blunt object."

> He added that an autopsy has been conducted to determine the cause of death, and the outcome of the awaited report will form part of the ongoing police probe.

> 'We urge the public to come forward with any information which could lead to the arrest of the assailant/s. Anyone with information may contact the investigation officer, Sergeant Vusumzi Xokozela, at the Knysna Detective Branch at 044 302 6652 or Crime Stop at 08600 10111," he said.

> At time of going to press Sergeant Spies reported that there had been no further developments on the case.



Sedgefield Island CONSERVANCY

Colonial Birds - Heron, Egrets and Cormorants in your tree!

In winter and spring, colonial nesting birds such as herons, egrets, ibis, spoonbills and cormorants begin preparing for the nesting season as they select mates, build nests, lay eggs and rear chicks. When this happens in a big tree in your garden, it is often welcomed by the homeowners and neighbours. The sight of these elegant birds flying in and out, their mating rituals and nest building all provide great joy for nature lovers.

The habit of nesting in groups is believed to provide better survival against predators. To this end, a large tree is required that is also near to a reliable food source. The Sedgefield Island provides several appropriate sites.

However, this "Happy Event" can soon lose its attraction as these heronries often become problematic to the humans residing in the area. The guano smell is offensive, the parent birds are noisy as their calls begin at dawn and are incessant throughout the day, and the hatched chicks are messy eaters dropping quantities of their food (particularly fish) onto the ground. This attracts scavengers and the rotting food adds to the offensive smell.

What can be done to alleviate this problem?

By Law you cannot chase or interfere with the birds once nesting has commenced and until all the young have flown the nest. All birds are protected by law with the exception of invasive species such as European starlings and Indian mynahs.

All is not lost:- The Island Conservancy can provide support and assistance.

We will make sure you know your rights within the law and good conservation practice.

We will monitor breeding colonies and protect them on our island.

We also provide or manage physical support for cleaning up mess and managing smells, interacting with the authorities, mainly Knysna Municipality and Cape Nature, to ensure our actions meet their requirements.

What can you do to clean up your Property?

Although The Island Conservancy will coordinate communication with Knysna Municipality, the municipality does not offer services on private property. To keep your garden clean and odour free we suggest the following:



- Sprinkling agricultural lime on guano
- Raking up and bagging the guano and spilled food regularly
- Applying pine gel to the area to mitigate the odour and as a disinfectant.

Please note:- it is advisable to wear protective clothing when dealing with any animal waste.

How others can help

If you are a regular dog walker or hiker, please monitor and report increased nesting activity to the conservancy.

Explain to neighbours what the Conservancy is doing and why intervention, often neglected in the past, is important. By promoting conservation, assisting with environmental initiatives, and inviting local people to discuss and cooperate in future policies — the conservancy is taking up a responsible role in society. Thanks to this, people are starting to see the conservancy as a benefit and not a burden.

Lars Nayler, an honourary SANParks Ranger, also assisted the conservancy in labelling all the indigenous trees along the path in the 'Green Bowl'. This is an area of lush green forest that supports many different species of birds and animals.

Over a period of 11 years these three ladies and other local volunteers have worked tirelessly to keep the conservancy going - and growing. They are well-known in the area, and are respected by both SANParks, and Cape Nature, as well as many other conservancies in and around Sedgefield.

In 2019 the committee decided it was time to hand over the reins and take a well-deserved rest, and the current committee has been running the Cola conservancy successfully for the past four years.

Last year, application was made to Cape Nature to incorporate Myoli Beach into the Cola Conservancy, and this was approved in January this year. We are now officially known as the Cola Myoli Conservancy.

A conservancy cannot operate on its own, and it is vitally important that we have the positive buy-in from the homeowners in our area.

Masithandane was blessed to be approached by Phumla Nyanthikazi from SanParks to be the recipient of their Mandala Day Outreach.

Phumla, with her two teams arrived at our premises ready to give a fresh coat of paint and face lift to the faded and dejected Reception area and Community-based Services Manager's Office. Indoor plants were also donated to make the area alive and welcoming.

The gardening team brought a mixture of 30 yellowwood and wild plum indigenous trees and plants. Together with Neil van Niekerk, a Permaculturist who is assisting Masithandane, some of the trees were planted. Neil is busy with a design for our Prayer, Food and Safe Park Gardens and other areas on the property to create a harmonious integration of the landscape for the community to provide food and wood in a sustainable holistic His design encourages children to engage with the site they spend time in by gardening and learning about various eco

systems and the environment. To start the local Aloe and exotic Agave (spikey plants) have been removed from the beds. (These were donated to Revive Sedgefield who are doing wonderful work beautifying Sedgefield.) Next, to bring in shrubs and other fruit and fragrant trees for short and midtier trees. Neil has mapped the contours of the area to create swales, (berms that capture water and help trees grow) major wind directions ensuring fresh wind moves through the play areas as well as sun movements

to have shade and sun where it's needed most during the seasons. Results from the study of the area show that new landscape of trees will provide shade, food and a natural bird life.

But alas, maybe this is too much

Anyway, it is rather obvious that large trees pose a threat to our power lines but when native trees, and even large indigenous shrub species, that pose no threat to our electricity infrastructure, are "butchered" then you need to ask yourself is there is a method behind the madness. Well, this is what our Electricity Department recently did along Whites Road, not considering the fact that most of these shrubs and trees posed absolutely no threat to our power transmission. I was even told that the unsightly cut branches would be removed, three weeks later they are still there

It does raise the question once again, if GM really cares about our natural environment. Have they heard about climate change or the 6th major extinction? I mean, what has changed in the way they operate in the last 10 years. From where I sit it's business as usual, climate change is something that happens somewhere else, as does biodiversity loss. Objections and concerns from SANParks, Cape Nature, and other concerned residents to developments are, in most cases, simply overruled or ignored. The Editor, Reply to Knysna Municipality - Sedgefield roads!!!!

In the most recent version of the Edge, Knysna Municipality has replied to my article about the poor state of roads in Sedgefield. It is a great pity that the Municipality did not tell Readers the truth about what they have done!

In regard to the main service roads north & south of the N2, the Municipality did not re-seal the roads in question. (Abt 1.4km on N & 1.3km on S)

On the north side, less than 2/3 of the length of the road was **RESURFACED**, not resealed. The resurfacing consisted of a hot-laid premix surface of about 20mm thickness. This resurfacing certainly improved the "ride", but regrettably, did not deal with the pools of water that still dot this section of road. This work was done ahead of any work on the south side service road.

We heard that the whole length of the north service road was not completed, as the Municipality found that the amount of premix needed was more than they expected, due to the much worse surface of the road. If this is true, one wonders why the Municipality did not carry out a more comprehensive assessment of this section of road before work started??? But why has the rest of that north service road not been resurfaced??? (An on-site inspection indicates that the resurfacing in fact went as far as Makou Street.)

In regard to the south service road, again only part of that road

was attended to. The road was resealed. The resurfacing from the east end, stopped at the intersection with Vink Street, near the SPAR. In this case, at a recent meeting of Ward 2 ratepayers, we were told that the current status and facts, namely: western section of this service road had not been resurfaced, because the road surface was in such poor condition due to undermining by moles.

One wonders what the Municipality were doing on a section of this road about a year ago, when we were told that they were installing "mole barriers". Part of this road was closed to through traffic for a while when this work was being carried out! In regard to "pot-hole repair", I personally have not seen any stabilised gravel" used before an asphalt overlay was applied. Possibly this was the intention????

The closing remark by the Municipality in regard to being committed to ensuring safe and smooth travel for all is a nice thought. Pity it is not done!!!

On top of this, the Municipality still has not done much about restoring the road markings along these **RESURFACED** sections of road. A dotted centre line is all that has happened. No edge markings and no parking spaces have been done.



Teen Depression Reaches All-time Global High

Depression has reportedly become the leading cause of illness and disability among adolescents worldwide, and in most cases goes undetected and untreated, increasing the risk of suicide.

Abdurahman Kenny, Mental Health Portfolio Manager for Pharma Dynamics, says while teen mental health was declining before COVID-19, the pandemic exacerbated feelings of sadness and hopelessness.

"Disruptions to routines, missed milestones, extended school disruptions, prolonged social isolation, fear and anxiety over health and finances have, without doubt, taken a cumulative toll on the mental well-being of youth. Extraordinary stress and disruption, as experienced during the pandemic, can be very damaging for a child's psyche that typically thrives on routine and predictability."

A study found older children to be impacted more severely than younger ones, likely because of puberty, hormonal changes, and lack of social interaction. Girls were more prone to depression and anxiety than boys, which

Depression has reportedly aligns with studies from before become the leading cause of the pandemic.

Kenny explains that depression, anxiety and behavioural disorders are among the most common mental health concerns in youths.

"Depressive symptoms, such as sadness, loss of interest in activities that used to bring joy, disturbed sleep, changes in appetite, lack in concentration, irritability, low energy or little motivation to do anything, risky or harmful behaviour, substance abuse and feeling hopeless for weeks on end can lead to suicide ideation if not properly addressed," he says.

In South Africa, where we have limited mental health resources, it's important for parents to become more aware of their children's behavioural changes to provide them with the right support.

Here's what you can do as a parent:

1. Be there for your child.

Show empathy and understanding – even if they don't want to talk to you or do much of anything. Depression makes doing even the smallest of tasks difficult. Validate their emotions, but not their unhealthy behaviour. Ask questions about their mood in a non-threatening way. Don't be judgemental or try to solve their problems; listen to what they are saying and let them know you are there for them while showing compassion for what they're going through.

2. Focus on the positive.

Compliment them on the positive things they do – even if it's just going to school, setting the dinner table or helping with the dishes. Try not to belabour their negative points, but acknowledge that they're trying. Remember - they don't want to feel this way. If they could 'snap out of it' they would, but depression doesn't work that way. Showing love and appreciation for the little things they do well will strengthen your relationship.

3. Encourage self-care.

While it may be difficult for your teen to look after themselves while feeling depressed, it's vitally important. Getting regular exercise, eating healthy meals, sleeping enough, participating in sports and wholesome hobbies that make them feel good about themselves, limiting screen time and social media use, practising gratitude by keeping a journal, encouraging social interaction, and setting achievable goals are all things they can do that will improve their mood and self-

4. Set boundaries.

Healthy boundaries are essential for youth to form positive relationships with others.

Setting these limits create physical and emotional safety for your teen, so they know what is acceptable and what is not. Even when they are depressed, rules should be respected.

5. Get them the help they need.

Discuss going to a therapist if their mood doesn't improve. If they don't want to go, ask how you can help. If they tell you to back off, don't retaliate with anger. It might just be their way of telling you they need space. Accept their response and give them some more time to think about it. If they don't come back to you, ask your GP to recommend a few therapists. Then suggest these therapists to your teen and ask them to make a choice. It's important to make them feel involved in the process, which sets the stage for effective

Kenny says there are several kinds of therapy that might be helpful.

"These include interpersonal therapy, cognitive behavioural therapy, and dialectical behavioural therapy, which all play a role in the recovery process. However, a thorough assessment should be done by a psychiatrist in order to recommend the most appropriate treatment for your child.

"Teenagers with depression may also benefit from medication, such as anti-depressants, but the best results are usually obtained when combining medicine with psychotherapy (talking with a therapist). That said, your teen has to be committed to therapy; therefore, finding a therapist your child can connect with is

He says while challenging behaviour tends to be the norm for teenagers, parents should be on the lookout for signs of depression, as early detection and treatment are crucial.




