

Brenton-on-Sea and Buffalo Bay beaches have once again received Blue flag status for the 2023/2024 holiday season.

Knysna Municipal Manager Mr Ombali Sebola said the iconic Blue Flag is one of the world's most recognised awards for beaches, marinas, and sustainable tourism boats.

"Each beach is measured in four categories: Environmental Education and Awareness, Water Quality, Environmental Management, and Safety Services. To qualify a series of criteria must be met and

maintained. We have a dedicated

internal programme to drive the requirements for the approval process and ensure the necessary standards are met. Blue Flag status is recognised by the public and they know what to expect when they visit the beaches."

South Africa has participated in the Blue Flag programme, implemented by the Wildlife Environmental Society of South Africa (WESSA), since 2001. Sebola said the coastal management accreditation programme recognises beaches meeting standards of excellence in water quality, environmental management, environmental education and information, as well as safety and services.

"The main criteria considered to achieve and maintain Blue Flag status are universal access, clear signage, control of domestic animals, effective waste and environmental management, and education.

The programme offers many benefits, including improved tourism facilities, enhanced management of coastal ecosystems, capacity building of coastal municipalities and increased awareness in general."

"Money for nothing, chicks for free!" brother number two warbled lyrically, clearly in Dire Straits.


"Here she comes now singing money, money!" I joined in in my best Billy Idol rant.

CRIMINALS ON CAMERA



Careful scrutiny of footage from the security camera network around Sedgefield has convinced local security groups, that a robbery which took place in Meedingsride on Wednesday 18 October, was almost certainly perpetrated by out-of-town criminals.

The local neighbourhood watch first heard of criminal activity on that day at about 7.50am when a report of two male intruders at 'Sandals' came through on a Whatsapp group. The men had been seen running through the complex.

Members of Community Orientated Policing (COP) rushed to the scene and obtained a description of them. "While we were there we were informed

about a serious crime including robbery and physical attack - that had taken place a few blocks away minutes before," said Mike Hofhuis of COP (exact address withheld at request of victims).

After confirming that SAPS were on the scene of that serious crime, Mike went to check if the security camera network had picked up any images of the two perpetrators and to see if they were the same who had been seen in the Sandals complex.

He discovered multiple 'captures' of them recorded on the digital system, the earliest of which was taken before the robbery had occurred. They were indeed the same men involved in both incidents.

"We are almost certain that they are not local," he reported, "We actually have footage of them entering Sedgefield just before

Imagery recorded a short while later, after the men left the home where they had just robbed and assaulted a couple, showed them running down Aloe Street before climbing over the wall into Sandals, presumably trying to get back to the N2.

SAPS members later discovered

many of the stolen belongings towards the highway. hidden near that wall.

Security camera footage taken at 7.52am recorded the same two running up Begonia Street, eventually entering the green belt on the south side of Fraser Street in the direction of Groenvlei. It is here they disappeared from view, possibly to lay low for a while, until 9.40am when the cameras directed at the Groenvlei Road adjacent to Lake Pleasant Resort picked them up emerging onto the tar and walking nonchalantly

"Eyewitnesses saw them crossing the N2 and making their way to the railway line," Hofhuis said, "But after hours of searching the surrounding area, using two security drones as well as a lot of manpower, it was clear they had gone. More than likely they had been picked up by a vehicle and whisked away.'

The good news is that SAPS has been granted access to all the images and footage captured by

the Sedgefield camera network which should assist them significantly as their investigation continues.

Hofhuis says that any crime of this nature occuring in Sedgefield causes great concern, so he was exceptionally impressed with the very swift response time to the serious incident, not only by the local crime prevention groups but also the officers from SAPS and all the security companies.

Collapse of natural infrastructure proves costly in Kaaimans

"Following heavy and consistent rain on Saturday, 21 October 2023, the collapse of a seep-line on the western slope of the Kaaimans gorge caused a landslide leading to the temporary closure of the N2 highway. This left the mountainside scarred with severe loss of indigenous vegetation," says Cobus **Meiring of the Garden Route** Environmental Forum (GREF).

Streams, seep-lines and wetlands on mountain slopes play an important role in ensuring their geological integrity and their ability to direct and absorb water flow. Sand dunes, rivers, streams, mountain catchments, forests and many other examples are referred to as natural infrastructure, and collectively they play an

"Invasive alien plants are very likely to claim the scar left by the landslide as they o u t c o m p e t e indigenous vegetation in terms of new growth," says Meiring.

Given the changing climate and rainfall patterns, which increase the probability of episodic

rain storms along the Garden Route, the region is likely to experience repeated damage to its road and rail infrastructure in the near future.

TALKING ABOUT PALLIATIVE CARE

Did you know that in South Africa, only 17.8% of folks who really need palliative care are getting it? Even though the government launched the National Policy Framework and **Strategy for Palliative Care** 2017-2022, it's still not doing enough for seriously ill people, especially here in our region and those living in the rural areas in the Western Cape.

What could make things better? If we all work together, organisations, hospitals and the community - we could make sure that everyone gets the care they need. Palliative care provides easier ways to get help, care plans that really focus on what the patient needs, and more support from a bigger team. Plus, it takes pressure off the busy hospitals and health clinics. This is why we're shining a light on palliative care - more information, more impact!

Here's a snippet of some conversations with 2 of our staff on palliative care:

Marline, our social worker, explains that she's learned to be fully present when she is with her patients and enjoys the support of her whole team. Marline says "Palliative care allows the patient, his/her family and myself to focus on care, address their distress and improve their quality of life."

Sister Hannelie, our Clinical Manager, gives her thoughts on 'why palliative care?' by saying that "its care for the community." She is passionate about helping the most vulnerable people AND their families. Sr Hannelie describes that Hospice is often "the last resort for a person - they've been through the mill and are desperate for help." That's why we step in to help everyone. Sr Hannelie reiterates what Marline has said, "Hospice puts everyone at ease."

And lastly, in honour of children's palliative care, we're including a definition of palliative care for children, in case you ever have to explain it to a grandchild or neighbour (or

SWEDES TAKE AR WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS RE/MAXLAKES

At 09:33 on 24 October, the Swedish Armed Forces Adventure Team crossed the finish line of the 2023 Adventure Racing World Championship at the Cape St. Francis Resort as the winners.

They completed the epic 840km Expedition Africa course through the Kouga region of the Eastern Cape in a time of 118 hours 33 mins 26 seconds (just short of five days), beating the other 106 teams from 30 nations who took off from the start line with them.

The race, a gruelling multi-day endurance event, challenged teams of four to navigate through rugged African terrain using a variety of outdoor disciplines such as trekking, mountain biking, kayaking, and more. With severe weather conditions, wild animals, and extreme physical demands, participants had to demonstrate

exceptional teamwork mental fortitude, and strategic planning to reach the finish line.

The winning team, comprising John Karlsson, Malin Hjalmarsson, Oskar Svärd and Per Vestling, opened up a significant lead on the 5th day of racing during a challenging 124km cycle ride through the Kouga Mountains and completed the final 32km coastal trekking stage overnight before reaching the finish line on the morning of day six of the race.

Sadly, local hopefuls Team Merrel Songlines, the South African champions touted for a home territory win, had to abandon their quest for a podium



finish in the early hours of their last day of racing. Teammate John Collins was forced to withdraw due to injury and a nasty stomach bug. The rest of his team - Kelvin Trautman, Lance Kime and Jeannie Dreyer

- continued the race, eventually crossing the finish line at 22.48 that night, just over ten hours behind the winners. The last team crossed the finish line five days later!



Be safe on wet roads paramedics plead

Underestimating danger cost lives

Wet weather creates hazardous conditions that can lead to accidents on our roads. Netcare 911 has issued an urgent call to action for drivers to be aware of the risks and offers practical tips for preventing accidents when driving in the rain.

"Every year, emergency medical services see the tragic consequences of rainy weather on our roads, often due to drivers not realising that cars handle very differently on wet road surfaces," says Sarah Kekana, Netcare 911 spokesperson.

The basics

Firstly, be prepared for all conditions by ensuring your car is in good working order. Standard checks should include brake function, wheel balance and alignment, and that your tyres have enough tread and are at the correct pressure.

"When storms and heavy rainfall strike unexpectedly, visibility is often diminished. In terms of the National Road Traffic Act, windscreen wipers must be kept in good working order. Drivers should regularly check their wiper blades and replace them as necessary,' Kekana says.

"Rainfall creates slippery and potentially hazardous road surfaces. In such conditions, it is essential to exercise heightened caution and remain vigilant for potential hazards, including flooded roads and low-lying bridges, as well as other unforeseen circumstances," Kekana

"The most important principles of driving in wet weather are to reduce your speed considerably and keep a longer following distance

from the car in front of you than usual and maintain visibility with your headlights on. Steer and apply brakes gently, indicate and maintain low RPMs or revs to minimise the risk of skidding."

Aquaplaning – stay calm

"One of the most frightening and unpredictable dangers of driving on wet surfaces is aquaplaning, where puddles on the road surface can cause your car's rear wheels to lose traction. The car's revs suddenly increase, the steering feels light or unresponsive, and the back end of the car may start to drift uncontrollably," she explains.



What to do:

- Stav calm
- Do not slam on the brakes, as this will make the situation worse
- Gradually release the
- accelerator Relax your grip on the steering wheel, but try to
- keep control gently Only apply brakes once you feel control return

Keep your distance

"In dry conditions, it is advised to keep a following distance of at least three car lengths between vour car and the vehicle in front of you. In wet weather, it is recommended that this is doubled to six car lengths to allow enough time to safely slow down and stop in an emergency," Kekana says.

"Maintain a safe distance from large trucks as their substantial wheels generate significant spray. Make sure that you can see their mirrors, otherwise, they can't see you. Big heavy vehicles such as trucks and buses also take much longer to stop, especially in wet weather, and drivers should avoid attempting to cut in front of any other vehicle.'

Don't take a chance

"Avoid driving in heavy downpours or low-lying floodprone areas as far as possible, and if you are travelling, check the weather forecast and local updates along your route. Even once the rain has stopped, approach standing water slowly and cautiously.

"Often water may be deeper than it appears, and it takes surprisingly little water for a car to get stuck or washed away or for the engine to stop working. If there is flooding, do not cross low-lying bridges, even if you think your car can make it across," she says.

Come rain or shine

"Rain or shine, your safety is a priority. Be prepared for any medical emergency by downloading the Netcare App, which includes Netcare 911 emergency call functions.

"Countless avoidable accidents happen each season when individuals underestimate the risks and gamble with their safety. The price of taking such chances is too high - prioritise life and make the choice to stay safe on our roads," Kekana concludes.

"But well-run means compliance with the necessary regulations. Please ensure that you allow enough time for the application processes and meet the set criteria when planning your next event."

What happened to you?

Understanding the impact of emotional trauma on the healing journey

We all need medical attention at one point or another, but underlying emotional traumas and unexpected triggers that may arise during a visit with a therapist, doctor or nurse can impede the healing process for some people. This everyday reality warrants heightened recognition and attention.

Dr Marshinee Naidoo, a specialist psychiatrist practising at Netcare Akeso Alberton and Netcare Akeso Parktown, says a holistic understanding of mental health and how trauma informs our experiences is crucial to an individual's wellbeing.

"Often, a consulting room or hospital can be a place where we experience some of our most vulnerable moments in life. While there is a general move towards becoming more engaged and informed about personal health, many individuals still feel disempowered in the very space they have gone to for help, often without knowing why, but this can have a lot to do with what happened to you - not only now but in your past."

Unpacking trauma

"There is a misconception that trauma has to refer to a massive event, which it often does, but it can also be a complex layering of many smaller hurts that build up over time. The way we perceive trauma may mean that we minimise what we or others are feeling if we believe that what happened is 'no big deal', which can discourage a person from accessing the care they need," she says.

"Everyone goes through some emotional hurt in their life, but when it is traumatic, different parts of our brains react in certain ways with physiological responses. The more primitive parts of the brain deal with survival and put us into a state of fight, flight or freeze, prompting coping mechanisms that provide a sense of safety or control.

"Other parts of the brain are linked to memory, and when trauma or shock is experienced, those parts can go into overdrive, disturbing rational thought and processing the experience in a disordered manner. This can result in fragmented memories of

Dr Naidoo explains that in addition to emotional damage, psychological trauma can be at the root of certain chronic conditions, as when the brain processes a traumatic event, it can go into a protective state, blocking out certain memories, which can result in a physical manifestation.

"Adverse childhood experiences – or ACEs as they are sometimes called - refer to negative experiences during childhood such as physical, emotional and sexual abuse, substance abuse and neglect, which can result in mental and chronic physical conditions later in life.'

According to Dr Naidoo, growing up with any of these experiences can predispose an individual to chronic body pain, chronic cough, headache, back pain, irritable bowel syndrome, allergic reactions, behavioural issues and other health concerns that may be misdiagnosed. These individuals may become frequent visitors to the emergency department or doctor's office without ever being able to get to the bottom of their problems.

Moving away from generational trauma

"While many people are still coming to terms with the stigmas around seeking mental help in

> coping with trauma, we are seeing encouraging trends in younger age groups. Gen Z, in particular, is showing more cases of individuals dealing with trauma earlier on and nipping it in the bud than previous generations, which is very positive for breaking generational patterns of belief.

"Many of these younger people feel unheard in their family or cultural community, which may not accept ADHD as a legitimate health condition or view a gender identity crisis with compassion, for example. However, in group therapy settings, they are finding a community of their own with others who have had similar experiences and who they can relate to," says Dr Naidoo

A change in approach for compassionate healing

While a shift towards greater trauma awareness is taking place in healing environments, Dr Naidoo points out that for longterm healing to take place, a holistic approach to care is required.

"First impressions really do last, and the people and atmosphere that greet a person when they walk into a healthcare facility might trigger anxiety and other emotions in them. They may also be carrying deep-seated traumas that are not visible but affect how they interact and accept help.

"Providing a safe space where people seeking care do not feel judged is a crucial aspect of a healing environment for physical or mental health concerns. Much as each person would wish to be met with kindness in their daily life, each individual will inevitably have better healthcare outcomes if they experience compassionate care that takes the possibility of previously traumatic experiences into account.


"As healthcare professionals, it is crucial that we are mindful of this and that we empower those in our care by listening more closely, being more transparent about treatment options and building firmer foundations of trust for patients to heal," concludes Dr Naidoo.







The front label is rather attractive and there is a fair amount of info on the back label. The wine originates from Slanghoek valley, in the Rawsonville area.


The appearance is clear, with a light straw colour. A few thin legs are visible, but disappear quickly.

No flaws on the nose, with aromas of green peach, dried fig roll and canned asparagus.

The Sauvignon fills the whole mouth, with acidity on a healthy balanced level. Green peaches and fig follows through from the nose.

It has a long mouth feel and the taste of figs and peaches lingers.

The wine compliments creamy
