ERF 1297 SAVED

At a Special Council meeting held on 30 September, the Garden Route District Municipality (GRDM) Council announced that since the controversial proposed development of Erf 1297 in Wilderness, a 30 hectare parcel of land commonly known as the Kleinkrantz Property had failed to pass its Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA), they had resolved to terminate the 99 year lease agreement between the district authority and the developer.

On the forefront of the lengthy battle to conserve this important environmental corridor is Wilderness and Lakes Environmental Action Forum (WALEAF), and Chair Melissa Dalton has issued the following statement on the recent council decision.

The WALEAF EXCO 1297 team has dedicated much time over the past three years towards protecting the last remaining corridor (coast-lakesmountains) in Wilderness from a large "mix-use development" proposed across most of the property by Waterleaf Properties. Our vision for the property, which is owned by the GRDM, has always been one that promotes the best conservation outcome, which in our mind is the transfer of the property to SANParks (since it buffers the National Park) with the option to upgrade and renovate the existing dilapidated buildings occupying a development footprint of approx. 2.1ha.

We were not only concerned by the ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT of the proposed development, but we had numerous questions around the ADMINISTRATIVE PROCESSES that led to a development lease agreement being signed in the first place, and without the proper public participation process

Our concerns around the environmental impact of the development were noted in the DBAR process (2024), along with many other interested and affected parties, but in spite of much opposition to the development with its high environmental footprint, the decision regarding the EIA lay in the hands of the Dpt. of Forestry and Fisheries' (DFFE in Pretoria). Had DFFE ultimately approved the EIA and permitted the development, WALEAF were committed to appealing the decision. However, we were advised by Leap ENVIRO on the 12 September 2025 that DFFE had rejected the EIA for the development proposal that LEAP had submitted on behalf of the developer.

DFFE's decision was based on a number of reasons, and while we were happy with the outcome, we also understood that this decision taken by DFFE was not an automatic cancellation of the lease nor a guarantee that the lease would be cancelled. The decision around the cancellation of the lease was in the hands of the GRDM, having ownership of the land, and throughout the EIA process, we continued to communicate to the municipality our concerns as well as calling for the cancellation of the

On 30 September, we were advised that, at a Special Council Meeting held at the GRDM Chambers, Council had taken a resolution to accept the recommendations on the Special Agenda to cancel the lease and initiate talks regarding the future of the property. My team is delighted with the decision.

We have stated on many occasions that once the lease is cancelled, we support the transfer of the property or as much thereof to SANParks, therefore the recommendation at the Council meeting to initiate talks with SANParks is also very encouraging and reflects the GRDM openness towards considering the best conservation outcome for this vital corridor.

There are a number of steps in the process before the future outcome of the property will be finalised and WALEAF will continue to monitor the process and engage with the relevant stakeholders to effect a positive environmental outcome. Until then, I would like to thank all those who

CHOO TJOE TO R

The Outeniqua Choo Tjoe – the Garden Route's and South Africa's beloved steam train – is going to run again.

Alan McVitty, CEO of Classic Rail and Outeniqua Choo Tjoe said on Monday that his company has acquired all the necessary contracts and has found the much-needed funding partners – to rebuild the line between George and Knysna, and to relaunch and run the train as a tourist attraction.

This after nearly 20 years of negotiations and disappointments.

"We plan to open the line in two phases – Knysna to Sedgefield and Sedgefield to George – and we expect the first phase to take about 12 months to complete. A Ceremonial Signature Event will be held to celebrate this landmark achievement made possible by a collaborative approach between Classic Rail, local businesses and Transnet Freight, so this isn't an actual opening: we're just sharing the good news with the public and the tourism industry that everything is on track and we are finally on our way.

With locomotives under repair in Gauteng, and carriages to be refurbished in George, the plan is to open a steam workshop along

the line, and to road haul the rolling stock to the Knysna-Sedgefield line to begin the first service

"We are kicking our project off by clearing the vegetation from the line so that we can properly examine and decide on which sections need repair. We will also have to survey the bridges as part of our front-end engineering," said McVitty, adding that project and passenger safety is paramount.

"It's too early to start taking bookings, however all stakeholders and clients will be kept up to date via our social media platforms and regular updates on project progress being made, but of course early bookings are going to be going to be the kicker if we're going to do this successfully for the Garden Route Region and South Africa.

The rebirth of the Outeniqua Choo Tjoe will bring even more tourism to the Garden Route, with the positive spin off of much-needed sustainable job creation, and because of the company's collaborative approach. Together with local businesses, every body will gain.

ADMINISTRATION ORDER **OVERTURNED BY NCOP**

On Friday 26 September include establishing a service **National Council of Provinces** Provincial MEC's notice to dissolve the Knysna Council and put Knysna Municipality under Administration.

This news was received with much relief by the majority of the council, particularly Knysna Executive Mayor, Thando Matika "Strong representations were made to the NCOP Select Committee during their visit on 23 September," he said, "I am grateful to the Chief Whips of nearly all political parties, as well as civil society organisations, who opposed this move. The NCOP dismissed the notice and advised that more support be given."

He cautioned, however that this reprieve certainly did not mean it was back to 'business as usual' for Knysna's local government.

"This is not a free pass – it is a call to action," he said in a statement issued soon after NCOP's announcement.

Warning that the ruling had come with a directive to Council to address specific matters, he laid out a 14-day turnaround strategy, a 30-day visible action plan and a 3-month intervention program. He believes these plans will stabilise urgent service delivery challenges within 14 days; demonstrate visible improvements in 30 days; implement sustainable interventions within three months; and strengthen innovation, accountability and public participation.

His statement highlighted that Sedgefield's Ratepayers

delivery "war room" chaired by the (NCOP) overturned the Executive Mayor; activating a 24/7 hotline and WhatsApp reporting tool; deploying emergency repairs task teams; initiating a stakeholder partnership forum; and an emergency repairs budget reallocation from the Operation Expenditure Budget.

> Clearly NCOP's vetoing of Provincial Government's order to put Knysna under administration has not been welcomed by all - the Democratic Alliance being the most vociferous in its objections.

> DA Western Cape Provincial Minister Anton Bredell condemned the decision as political interference which he said undermined efforts to save Knysna.

"The decision of the NCOP has effectively put the Municipal Council back in charge of its own recovery and implementing support measures offered by the National and Provincial Government," he said, "Council's track record has shown that it is unable to correct its self-inflicted governance failures, which is causing raw sewage to flow into streets, homes, nearby waterways and the Knysna estuary, posing severe health and environmental

disappointment, citing numerous failures of the Municipality with regards to Sedgefield's infrastructure, service accountability and law enforcement.

"The residents of Sedgefield are increasingly alarmed by the persistent failures and mismanagement within Knysna Municipality. Despite repeated assurances, key services remain inconsistent, reactive, and poorly managed, leaving the community frustrated and forced to escalate issues just to be heard," said Chair

Kevin Barnes, "Sedgefield residents will not stand by quietly. We demand urgent intervention to restore proper service delivery, enforce the law, and rebuild trust between the Municipality and the people it

Mayor Matika has acknowledged serious service delivery challenges in water, wastewater and refuse management, but insists that progress has been made since he took office in February,

He cautioned residents not to

expect quick fixes. "Many of our problems stem from old and crumbling infrastructure that will cost millions to replace. We are engaging National Treasury mechanisms such as the Budget Facility for Infrastructure (BFI) to secure funding for large-scale projects."

The Mayor met with senior management on 30 September to demand detailed short-, mediumand long-term plans to address these challenges. He added that officials must also acknowledge their responsibilities, as they are a

key pillar in the local government structure.

"A customer-centred approach must form the foundation of our collective response to these challenges. The focus should shift from obstacles; we must be able to see beyond them and be innovative in our thinking," he said. "Consequence management will be enforced and staff will be held accountable.'

He thanked residents, business leaders and civic organisations for

Understanding my role in the environment

Have you ever reflected on your moral relationship with the natural world? It challenges us to consider how our actions affect the environment and, in turn, how the environment impacts our lives. This relationship is not about conservation; it is about recognising our responsibilities toward the ecosystems that sustain us. Picture the earth as a vast, interconnected web, where every action we take sends ripples through this web. How can we ensure that our actions strengthen rather than damage this web?

To live "environmentally conscious" one must establish an ethical framework for yourself that guides your interactions with nature. This framework will help you navigate complex decisions, such as whether to prioritise economic growth over ecological preservation. Having a moral compass in a world where industrialisation often surpasses environmental concerns, becomes essential. An ethical environmental approach encourages us to ask questions like: What is our duty to future generations? What is our duty to our natural environment? How do we balance human needs with the health of our planet? Additionally, environmental ethics highlight the importance of recognising the intrinsic value of nature. They invite us to see the environment not merely as a resource to exploit but as a living entity deserving of our respect and protection. This perspective prompts a shift from a human-centred view of the world to one that embraces a more complete approach. For instance, consider the plight of endangered species. The ethical question arises: do we have a moral obligation to protect them, even if it means sacrificing some of our own conveniences? This is where the heart of environmental ethics lies, urging us to consider the broader consequences of our actions.

In addition, environmental ethics often cross with economics, politics, and social justice as they foster a sense of stewardship and responsibility. This challenges us to rethink our relationship with nature, urging us to act not just in our own interests, but in the interest of the planet and its diverse habitats and inhabitants. Our view must be to evaluate not just the economic costs, but also the environmental costs and benefits, which will lead to a more holistic approach. We should never argue that the economic benefits outweigh the environmental damage as this must raise the question: are we sacrificing our health, the health of our planet, for short-term

International Coastal Cleanup Day



On Saturday, 20 September 2025 Apex Conservation Services, together with Eden Surfriders Association hosted a Coastal Cleanup along the Garden Route to celebrate International Coastal Cleanup Day.?

There were a total of twelve zones spanning 25km where cleanup teams were involved, including coastal areas located from Victoria Bay to Goukamma Nature Reserve and Sedgefield lagoon.

This event was supported by a total of 165 participants, collecting a total of 71 bags of rubbish with a combined weight of approximately 197 kg.?

The day started off with teams meeting at each zone where they were given an introduction to coastal pollution, plans for the day and the aim of the coastal cleanup. ? These teams were located at Victoria Bay, Wilderness, Kleinkrantz, Swartvlei, Myoli Beach, Goukamma Nature Reserve and Sedgefield Lagoon. ?

Teams then undertook a quadrant survey to identify the different types of rubbish present. 'A total of 10 quadrants of 2x4m were drawn at the highwater mark, rubbish was identified within each of these, and different types of rubbish were separated.?

There were a number of different types of rubbish found in these quadrants, including both larger pieces of rubbish and microplastics, which were dominant across all sites. Often a less obvious source of pollution, micro-plastics are small pieces of plastic which pose a huge threat to marine life.

Once the quadrant results had been recorded, the teams at each zone then started on their coastal cleanup, walking along the beach and lagoon and surrounding areas collecting rubbish.?

Once the rubbish had been collected, this was weighed and disposed of.?

A number of key indicators of plastic pollution on the beaches were collected in 5L bottles. This included a 5L bottle with cigarette butts, sucker sticks, and earbuds, and another 5L with bottle caps and lighters.

At the end of the day we handed out prizes from the lucky draw, which included a getaway in Hoekwil sponsored by Mountain Magic, a voucher sponsored by Joplins Steak Bar, as well as caps from Apex Conservation Services. ? Participation prizes were also handed out to participants who had gone the extra mile! ?

Says Bruce Taplin of Apex "We are grateful to everyone who gave of their time and energy to help in this event, specifically Eden Surfriders Association, the Oystercatcher Surf Club, Slow Town Surfers, The Strandloper Project and daboys for joining us in making this event possible.? We would also like to thank SANPArks for providing us with the bags that we used to collect rubbish, and their Biodiversity Social teams for their involvement in this event."

"We hope that this coastal cleanup event helped create awareness of coastal pollution, especially the threats that microplastics pose to our coastal systems and marine life."

The Coastal Beach Clean on 20 September was well supported as always, but I was very interested to meet a young man named Slade, who is quite well known in the surfing fraternity of the area.

I would like to tell you more about this modest, kind, young man.

Slade works with a group of children from Smutsville, who call themselves the 'Slow town surfers', and he had brought his group to the beach to join in the fun.

Slade started working with children from Smutsville as far back as 2016, through an initiative started by Lyle Katzen and his wife from Afrovibe backpackers. After five years Lyle went on to explore other things, but Slade decided to continue the program on his own.

Once a week, usually Friday, he takes the children to Buffalo Bay where the surf is more gentle for young and new surfers. Once they've spent an hour or two in the sea, they are given a hearty lunch, donated by another good Samaritan from Sedgefield.

Slade relies on donations to help with his club, however he adds

(quite matter-of-factly).

"I also pay out of my back pocket". What an inspiration.

Back to the beach clean. What impressed me was the enthusiasm with which these children arrived at the beach. Armed with large bottles to put various items intobottle tops, plastic items and anything else of interest, as well as recycle bags - off they went, returning an hour later with all sorts of interesting things to be thrown away.

It's so important to start educating our children from this early age about the importance of protecting our Earth. Well done Slade, you are making such a difference in young people's lives.

Once all the bags had been collected and placed together for the Knysna Municipality to dispose of, everyone was given an ice-cream cone courtesy of Pili Pili Restaurant, in appreciation of their hard work.

Thank you Pili Pili, there's nothing more heart warming than the look on a young face as they take their ice-cream cone.



BOU EN VOLHOU WEEK: BUILDING STRONGER COMMUNITIES IN KNYSNA & SEDGEFIELD

Last week, the communitydriven initiative Bou en Volhou Week took place across Knysna and Sedgefield, marking a milestone in local civic engagement. From road repairs to thought-provoking talks and vibrant community discussions, the week highlighted what can be achieved when people come together to improve their environment and build a stronger, more united community.

The initiative was led by AfriForum's Knysna branch, alongside its sister forum, Kaapse Cape Forum. Both organisations cited that it was aimed at investing in the community's future.

"By bringing together diverse cultures and communities, the Bou en Volhou week emphasised the importance of local action in addressing ongoing challenges. Waiting for the municipality to address long-standing issues is no longer an option — it is community-driven solutions like these that will ensure sustainable, long-term change," said Knysna AfriForum's Vice Chair Rethea Lombaard.

Local volunteers, including AfriForum Youth, Neighbourhood Teams, and Kaapse Forum management, joined forces to tackle multiple projects aimed at improving road safety, environmental sustainability, and community

The most visible - and perhaps welcome - project of the week was the road improvements done in both Knysna and Sedgefield. In Sedgefield, volunteers began preparing the surface and, later, laying down the tar along a section of Kingfisher Drive, enhancing road safety for the entire community. At the same time, the Knysna Team focused on painting speed bumps and repainting road markings in key areas like Long Street, ensuring better visibility

and safety for both pedestrians and motorists.

"But it wasn't just about the roads," says Rethea, "In addition to the physical improvements, the community's spirit was further strengthened with the launch of the recycling initiative. Locals now have the opportunity to sign up and, in return, the AfriForum Knysna team will collect their recyclables and deliver them to the correct processing facilities. This initiative aims to promote sustainability and encourage environmentally responsible behaviour within the community.'

The Bou en Volhou Week culminated on Saturday evening with a community event at which attendees were treated to speeches by two influential figures: Kallie Kriel, the Chief Executive Officer of AfriForum. and Ernst van Zyl, AfriForum's Head of Public Relations.

The evening focused on the theme "The AfriForum Perspective of South Africa and the USA." Kallie and Ernst shared their views on the political landscape in both countries, touching on the importance of intercultural respect, community activism, and local governance. Their insights sparked deep conversation among the audience about the current challenges faced in South Africa and how the AfriForum approach helps empower local communities to take control of their future.

Earlier in the week, a community meeting in Sedgefield provided an opportunity for locals to come together and discuss key issues impacting the area. The discussion covered a broad range of topics, including updates on the local dune restoration project, the role of

the Fourth Sphere of Government, and the importance of intercultural respect in building a united community. "One of the most exciting aspects

of the meeting was the engagement in working together," Rethea reported, "Residents voiced their thoughts on how collaboration between diverse community groups, local government, and AfriForum can lead to tangible progress. There was a strong call for greater involvement in communitydriven projects, such as road maintenance and environmental protection, all designed to ensure the long-term prosperity and safety of Knysna and Sedgefield." She said that as the Bou en Volhou Week wrapped up, it became clear that this initiative is more than just about road repairs and recycling.

"It is a model for community

action and unity. Whether it's

fixing potholes, painting road

markings, or gathering for thoughtful discussions, the week proved that when volunteers and local organisations unite under a shared goal, powerful change can happen," she suggested.

AfriForum Knysna is reportedly already planning more community-driven events to continue the momentum built this past week. According to Rethea, the recycling campaign is just the beginning of an ongoing effort by the apolitical organisation to address environmental issues while strengthening the local economy.

"The Bou en Volhou Week demonstrated the potential of working together. We are reminded that positive change doesn't just happen in boardrooms or offices; it happens in our streets, in our homes, and with our hands in the dirt," she

A LIFELINE FROM ABO

Soon after our daughter was diagnosed with cerebral palsy, I met a mom in a shop who recognised the signs and shared her story. Her kindness and guidance were a lifeline from above, offering valuable advice and direction. She sent me the following article which put into words the journey I found myself on:

"I am often asked to describe the experience of raising a child with a disability - to try to help people who have not shared that unique experience to understand it, to imagine how it would feel.

It's like this...

When you're going to have a baby, it's like planning a fabulous vacation trip - to Italy. You buy a bunch of guide books and make your wonderful plans. The Colosseum. The Michelangelo David. The gondolas in Venice. You may learn some handy phrases in Italian. It's all very

After months of eager anticipation, the day finally arrives. You pack your bags and off you go. Several hours later, the plane lands. The flight attendant comes in and says, "Welcome to Holland."

"Holland?!?" you say. "What do you mean Holland?? I signed up for Italy! I'm supposed to be in Italy. All my life I've dreamed of going to Italy."

But there's been a change in the flight plan. They've landed in Holland and there you must stay.

The important thing is that they haven't taken you to a horrible, disgusting, filthy place, full of pestilence, famine and disease. It's just a different place.

So you must go out and buy new guide books. And you must learn a whole new language. And you will meet a whole new group of people you would never have

It's just a different place. It's slower-paced than Italy, less flashy than Italy. But after you've been there for a while and you catch your breath, you look around ... and you begin to notice that Holland has windmills ... and Holland has tulips. Holland even has Rembrandts.

But everyone you know is busy coming and going from Italy ... and they're all bragging about what a wonderful time they had

Friday morning, 19 September, started with a phone call from our team working in the kitchen of the municipal offices.

The loss occurred at 3am, and it seemed the thief had decided he should attempt to sell the empty cylinder to the staff of Shell Petrol Station - who stay open for this type of service (NO!). Of course the attendants refused, but not before the thief's face and



REVIVING GARDEN ROUTE RAIL

PART TWO: HOW?

by Jasper Cook

Do you ever hear of anyone saying a road makes a profit? Decades before SANRAL came into being. SA built wonderful highways and freeways. Nobody ever asked if they made a profit.

Why, then, is it the first question asked about rail? In old SAR days, goods trains were seen as profitable and passenger as a fruitless loss. Yet, one could reach anywhere in SA by train and its RMT (Road Motor Transport) partner. It was seen as important to have passenger rail.

The current national government appears to think that minibus taxis are adequate for tourism. They are wrong. Do you want to crush yourself into one, and travel through baking Karoo heat without aircon? Taxi drivers don't like aircon, nor do their passengers. Minibus taxis are for brave backpacker adventurers.

The Western Cape government wants to take over commuter rail in Cape Town. We hope they will do the same for the Garden Route. Passenger rail is not solely for getting people to work.

Tourism

In a recent video, Wayne Duvenage said:

"Australia ... gets more tourists than us. And they've got a rock and a kangaroo and a barrier reef, quite frankly, and they are on the end of the world. It takes ages to fly there from Europe ... We've got diversity, flora, fauna, beauty, people, everything going for us. And [yet] we can't outpunch Australia.'

That is frustrating. Years ago, I put a young man on a coach in PE, headed for Cape Town.. He was on holiday in SA.

"One amazing postcard view after another" is how he described the coach trip through the Garden Route. In many places, the train has better views than the

road. Rovos Rail, for many years, featured a day trip on the Tjoe-Choo in their package. Tourists can't get enough of the Garden Route. Does the DA know what a tourism jewel we have here? The young man did not return to England for more than a decade

Provincial government, given the use in case of emergency vehicles discussed in Part One, should look at repairing the line: emergency vehicles are a good place to starting, but why not reach full potential? Run trains to get learners to school, relieve the N2, and bring in tourists.

Beyond George

More importantly than just the George - Knysna section, there is Mossel Bay and beyond. It is time to build again, to restore and upgrade. Connecting Caledon with Swellendam will cut 65 km from the route, allowing George to Cape Town in six hours, beating minibus taxis. Rail will never compete with a one hour flight on trip time, but on fares, no airline can compete. The cheapest one way George - CT flights start at around R800. Most flights are around R4000.

Even without connecting Caledon and Swellendam, and using the existing route, George to Worcester would be a 6 hour trip in a train like Queensland Rail's Spirit of the Outback. That train runs on Cape Gauge, like



ours, and is optimised for higher speed travel than our current low-tech clanking main line trains. On straight sections in Queensland, it operates at up to 160 kph. It would not do that without an upgrading of the existing track, but certainly would outstrip road vehicles, averaging 78 kph. Currently, the PRASA fare rate to East London is R 0.30c per km in sitter trains. Even raising that to R 0.48c per km would allow charging R272 to Cape Town. That fare could comfortably be doubled, and still beat minibus taxis on their price (R 470 - R 650), but not on exactly the same route. Minibuses from George would not go through Worcester as rail does. Connecting Caledon and Swellendam will cut an hour from the current Worcester route, and treat tourists to the view over Cape Town descending Sir Lowry's Pass.

Even a coach can't match a train for comfort, and nothing matches rail for safety. It is time for PRASA (or its replacement) to design real, modern tourist train sets. Would you not enjoy mountains and sea gliding by, sipping steaming coffee and a muffin, knowing there are toilet, and handicap facilities for your senior family and friends? Japan and Australia did it on the same gauge as ours, South Africa is awash with talent, waiting to design and build.

MEN'S HEALTH: Prostate cancer is on the rise

Prostate cancer requires year- Padayachee, a urologist practising round awareness and regular screening in all South African communities to help reduce the toll of this disease on our nation's fathers, brothers, husbands and sons. Three urologists share their specialist insights on the advances that are enabling earlier detection and more treatment options that are considered only when needed.

Cause for concern among SA

"Prostate cancer is the most common non-cutaneous, that is not skin-related, cancer in South Africa in males," says Dr Sumesh

Sedgefield

at Netcare Rosebank Hospital.

"The local historical data on prostate cancer has not always necessarily been an accurate reflection of the true extent of this major health burden, but in the last 15 years, we have seen the prevalence increase by 60%.

In part, this is due to better screening policies and more men coming forward for screening with the improved technology we have available to detect prostate cancer. Even with these factors considered, unfortunately, prostate cancer is definitely on the rise – the good news is that we are better equipped than ever to

condition," Dr Padayachee says.

Dr Amit Kalpee, a urologist who practises at Netcare Christiaan Barnard Memorial Hospital, explains that there are generally two very different variants of prostate cancer.

"The more aggressive variant, which tends to appear earlier, shows a strong genetic link. Patients with this type could be in their 40s or early 50s and usually have a strong family history of cancer, whether prostate or another kind. Fortunately, this variant is generally rare," he says. "A more common presentation is later in life, at age 70 and beyond. This group generally present with a slower growing cancer and often treatment may not be required at all, as the cancer is less likely to

become advanced to a stage where

it would affect their remaining life

expectancy.'

Studies locally and internationally have shown that a family history, with a father or brother with prostate cancer, and being of African heritage are factors associated with a higher risk of prostate cancer. A sedentary lifestyle, consuming a high fat diet, smoking and being overweight can also contribute to an individual's risk," Dr Kalpee

manage this common urological Hospital, adds that the emerging trends in prostate cancer screening and treatment are refining the experience for men while also improving outcomes.

> "Multi parametric MRI scans are helping to better target biopsies, when needed, which helps to rule out the need for further investigation or treatment in many cases," she says.

> "Where men do require treatment, the methods today are far less invasive, with tools such as brachytherapy seed implants, or minimally invasive surgical options including robot assisted or laparoscopic surgery which reduce recovery time and complications."

> For men with higher risk localised prostate cancer, that is when the cancer is still confined to the prostate gland, therapies are sometimes combined for greater effectiveness, such as radiotherapy and androgen deprivation both being incorporated as part of the person specific treatment plan.

> "Newer types of imaging and biomarkers, which are blood tests that look for signs of potential progression, are helping to predict more aggressive forms of prostate cancer better, and this gives the person and their multi disciplinary team an informed basis for managing or monitoring the disease," Dr Fisher says.

Active surveillance

Dr Padayachee explains that active surveillance is sometimes all that is required for men with prostate cancer. This involves regular Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) blood tests and MRI scans that closely monitor the tumour, enabling the person to potentially live without treatment for years, while allowing for an early opportunity to intervene and explore treatment options for a cure if the need should arise.

"Sometimes, there can be a window of 10 to 15 years from diagnosis before prostate cancer progresses. So, in many cases, a man may outlive the cancer with no symptoms, as prostate cancer tends to be very slow growing unless it is an aggressive subtype, such as those that are more common in African males, unfortunately.'

Person-centred treatment

Dr Padayachee emphasises that if treatment is required, the risk and benefit of each option should be weighed up carefully with the

support of a multi disciplinary team, which includes urologists, oncologists, radiologists, nuclear physicians and psychologists for holistic consideration according to the person's personal choices and circumstances.

"The treatment of prostate cancer has certainly evolved over the years, with treatments that not only prolong life but also improve quality of life. Options are also individualised based on the person's overall health, the stage or aggressiveness of the cancer and the best possible shared outcome," Dr Kalpee adds.

Treatment options for more aggressive prostate cancers include external beam radiation therapy, chemotherapy and hormonal therapy with treatment plans that are centred around the needs of the individual in a shared decision-making environment.

"For individuals for whom surgery is an option, we are fortunate in South Africa to have several skilled robotic surgeons who can remove the prostate entirely through keyhole procedures. In healthy patients with early cancer, this is often the treatment of choice," Dr Kalpee

Screening remains key

All three urologists emphasise that regular screening and understanding your individual risk are essential for men with an anticipated lifespan of over a decade. "Discuss screening with your doctor; it's not a one-sizefits-all approach," they say.


Screening guidelines

Early PSA testing is encouraged for well-informed men who do not have noticeable symptoms and have with a life expectancy of over 10 years who are at high risk of prostate cancer.

PSA screening should be initiated as follows for groups at higher risk for prostate cancer:

- All men, from the age of 50
- From the age of 45 years in black African men, and in men with a positive family history of prostate and/or breast cancer in a first-degree relative (e.g. father, mother, brother or sister).

OTTER CHAMPIONS REWRITE HISTORY

On 4 October 2025 in Nature's Valley, history was made at the Otter TERREX Trail, presented by EasyEquities, with two hat-trick wins accomplished for the first time and a four-year record tumbling.

Race morning dawned to a charged energy with athletes, supporters, staff and spectators nervously waiting to see how the 17th edition of the Grail of Trail would unfold. A competitive field - including past winners and current record holders - made their way to the start line in Storms River and prepared for the gun signalling the start at 06h30.

Conditions that begged for a rapid race opened the day with a cooler start that broke to a comfortable morning. Dry trails made for high expectations as athletes set off on the 42 kilometre course from Storms River to Nature's Valley. Renowned by many as the pinnacle of diverse racing in trail running, the course along the Otter Trail is unique as racing experiences go: not only is the trail closed throughout the year meaning athletes cannot practice outside of the race - but the terrain itself can be unyielding, featuring technical boulder sections, long stretches of beach sand, and 2400 metres of vertical gain accumulated over 11 climbs. eight of which do not exceed 100 metres of climbing.

A Record Breaking Race

Ultimate winner Bianca Tarboton clocked in at the first check point in the lead and, from there, a pattern of an extended lead would emerge. Race favourite and record holder of Otter's Retto direction – the reverse course, run from Nature's Valley to Storms River - Toni McCann was forced to withdraw early in the race, downed by an ankle sprain at 7 kilometres. Leading the race at the time, just 20 seconds ahead of

Tarboton, McCann had her sights set on a possible victory.

From a 12 minute lead at Scott's Hut - approximately 15 kilometres into the race -Tarboton continued to extend the gap, finishing almost 49 minutes ahead of second place Rebecca Watney. She arrived to an explosion of applause, with the Race Village brimming with supporters welcoming home athletes after the gruelling race.

Her finishing time of 04:30:55 sits well under her previous course record, a time of 04:45:34 set in 2021, clocking a new Classic course record by more than 14 minutes. She had positioned her eventual winning time as a secret goal, but said she focused on consistent and comfortable pacing in the moment, rather than dictating her race with a time in mind. Beaming and in slight disbelief, she said after the race. "I'm on cloud nine. It still hasn't sunk in just yet, but I know I am completely over the moon with that race.'

The buzz of excitement in the Race Village only amplified as the day wore on, as Watney was welcomed home to cheers and embraces after claiming her second Otter podium. Retired professional mountain bike rider and cycling Olympian Robyn De Groot rounded the women's podium, proving her mettle in a newer discipline to her sporting experience.

For the First Time, Otter sees a Back-to-Back Victory

On the men's side of the field, Robbie Simpson stormed his way to his third victory in a row, etching his name in Otter history as both the first international athlete to win three, and the first athlete to complete a hat-trick of wins. His victory seemed as though it might be under threat at Andre Hut, 8 kilometres from the finish line, as Robbie Rorich ran just two minutes behind Simpson.

With the final stretch suiting Simpson's pace and stride, the Scotsman was ultimately able to open the gap and take the finisher's ribbon in a time of 04:04:59, besting his previous fastest time on the course by 8 minutes. Simpson reflected that he is "absolutely delighted" with the win, saying, "it's a tough race, and nothing is a given, but you just have to keep fighting for

Rorich laughed about his experience at the 30 kilometre river crossing, saying, "My legs were just cramping at Bloukrans, I spent time in the rivers to cool

off, letting the water flow over and giving time for the mind to

Kane Reilly completed his 13th Otter, racing to his 9th podium, finishing in 04:12:38, just seconds behind Rorich.

A Prize Purse Deeper Than Ever

The first man and woman walked away with R100,000, a combination of cash and equities. Tarboton walks away with R190,000, having broken the course record, added R30,000 for the local fastest time as well as R60,000 for the overall record.
