ELEVATED SALINITY LEVELS IN DRINKING WATER

Knysna Municipality Press Statement issued 5pm 18/11/25

We wish to inform residents that recent routine monitoring and water quality inspections have detected elevated salinity levels in the Sedgefield drinking water supply. While we can confirm that the water remains microbiologically safe for consumption, the increased salt content may affect taste and could present challenges for individuals with high blood pressure, kidney-related conditions, or those on sodium-restricted diets.

We therefore advise residents, particularly vulnerable groups such as the elderly, infants, and those with chronic health concerns, to exercise caution when consuming tap water until salinity levels return to normal.

As part of our commitment to transparency, detailed monitoring and inspection results will be published and shared with the community through our official communication platforms and municipal notices as soon as they become available. To reduce the impact on households, water tankers will be carting potable water to the community.

We sincerely appreciate the community's patience and understanding as we continue working to restore acceptable water quality levels.

Knysna Municipality is calling for urgent water conservation amid continued dry weather conditions.

The local authority has issued an urgent appeal to all residents, businesses and visitors across Greater Knysna to drastically reduce water consumption, as early indicators point to a dry summer season. Municipal infrastructure data paints a concerning picture for both Sedgefield and Knysna.

"With the Swartvlei Estuary mouth closed, saline water is again migrating towards the Karatara weir. Should this contaminate the abstraction pool, and the river remains low, we will not be able to produce potable water from this source," explained Knysna Executive Mayor Thando Matika. "Three of the six boreholes drilled to service the Sedgefield area during the drought of 2008 are currently operational. Pumps should be installed at two of the remaining boreholes by 30 November. The last borehole had to be abandoned as it produced saline water."

Knysna's main storage facility, the Akkerkloof Dam, currently stands at approximately 27% capacity, equating to just 17 days of water storage, while the Glebe Dam adds a further eight days. The Knysna River, one of the town's primary raw water sources, is running extremely low and pumping operations have already been reduced to specific intervals to protect infrastructure and conserve

Recent rainfall patterns have been well below the long-term average, with August 2025 recording only 5mm at the Knysna Water Treatment Works, the lowest on record for that month. According to the South African Weather Service, rainfall for the Garden Route region is predicted to be approximately 26% lower than average over the summer period.

"The situation is serious, and it requires every one of us to act responsibly," said Matika. "We must all recognise that water resources are under pressure and everyone's cooperation is vital in helping us manage this period of low rainfall. We are intensifying water restrictions, exploring all available supply options and accelerating conservation efforts. However, these measures will only succeed if our community works together to use water sparingly.

To ensure water security, the municipality is considering the following urgent measures:

- water restrictions remain in place across the Greater Knysna
- investigating the reactivation of the Knysna Reverse Osmosis Plant, which has been in preservation mode since 2022;
- optimising existing pumping schemes to capture rainfall during brief wet spells;
- exploring groundwater sources and potential off-take agreements with local landowners;
- consulting with SANParks regarding the rules and potential consequences of opening the Swartvlei mouth; and
- expanding the public water conservation campaign to reach households, businesses and tourism operators ahead of the

To ensure compliance, municipal Law Enforcement Officers will be conducting regular inspections to identify non-compliance with water restrictions. Offenders will face fines in accordance with the municipal by-laws. Residents are urged to report any water abuse or illegal connections by sending a WhatsApp message to, or calling,

With a seemingly continuous odour permeating various areas of Sedgefield, thanks to three malfunctioning sewerage pump stations, we asked Knysna Municipality for the plan of action to resolve this stinky issue. The response from the Director Infrastructure Services, Mr Reginald Wesso is as follows:

The station on Lake Pleasant Drive recently experienced a routine mechanical breakdown, which was repaired on 10 November 2025, and the facility is fully operational again.

At Island Village, the issue has been traced to the MCC (motor control centre) panel. Repairs are underway and installation is expected to be completed by the end of this week, after which the pump station will return to service. Once Island Village is fully operational, the damaged Cola Beach pump will undergo repairs, estimated to take between one and two weeks. To prevent any sewer overflows during this period, both affected pump stations are being serviced by a vacuum tanker.

The municipality is currently assessing the full portfolio of 113 sewer pump stations across the Knysna area. This forms part of a broader design review to ensure that each station is equipped with both a duty and a standby pump, strengthening overall reliability and service

Cubing Challenge in Sedge

There aren't too many toys that cause as much frustration as the Rubik's cube. Yet it is the most purchased toy over the past 50 vears!

There are about 43 quintillion possible combinations for the 3x3 Rubik's cube – that is to say, unless you know the steps to solve one, you will likely never figure it out by yourself. At this point you are probably saying that you could always solve one side. That might seem impressive to some, but there is a massive global community of speedcubers who have taken to the idea of solving all sorts of twisty puzzles as fast (or in as few moves) as possible. The most prominent global tracker for these times and rankings is the World Cubing Association (WCA).

On Saturday 1st November the WCA, along with the HomeCode Speedcubing Club, hosted a competition at the Town Hall. The nearly fifty participants came from Cape Town, PE, Mossel Bay, Knysna and George with most of the local competitors being newcomers. There were 7 events that were timed and judged with international standards, including the 2x2, 3x3, 4x4, Pyraminx, Megaminx, Skewb (no, I'm not making these names up) and onehanded 3x3. The day was long and exceptionally exciting as South

African legends such as Daniel Rush (Africa's top cuber), Daniel Mizen, Daniël Switijnk and Caspar Switijnk set jawdropping times. The 3x3 was getting solved under 10 seconds, the 2x2 under 2 seconds and an African record for the 4x4 was set

Most exciting, however, were our local solvers such as Abbey Jones who solved a 2x2 in 5.75s, Ethan Bauer with an 8.68s solve of the Pyraminx and Joshua Cassiem who had an average of 23.58s on the 3x3. Our young people did exceptionally well - many of them setting personal best times. The event was a phenomenal opportunity to get a global ranking, spend time with the incredible community and courage each thanks go out to the organisers and our amazing Sedgefield hosts. You can bet we'll have more competitions to come as our cubers whittle down their times and learn to solve new puzzles. Who knows, perhaps you'll even be in the next one?

SAPS CATC LEEING DRUG

The persistent efforts by police to eradicate drug trafficking, as part of ongoing Safer Festive Season operations, yielded excellent dividends with the confiscation of drugs with an estimated street value of R470 000 after a vehicle chase on the N2 highway in Knysna.

At about 22:30 on Sunday, 16 November, Knysna Crime Prevention unit members were strategically deployed to conduct patrols in the central business district. When the vigilant

members spotted a vehicle parked in Main Street and approached, it sped off, and a high speed vehicle chase ensued. The vehicle was brought to a holt on the N2 highway near the Knysna Provincial Hospital, and when members proceeded with a search two large parcels were found in the back containing 58,85kgs of

Police confiscated the drugs and arrested both occupants of the vehicle, also siezing three cell phones, a scale and an undisclosed amount of cash. The suspects, aged 43 and 49, remain in police custody and were set to appear in the Knysna Magistrates' court on Monday, 17 November 2025 on a charge of dealing in drugs.

Western Cape police management lauded the vigilance of the members who pursued the suspects and ensured that the consignment was intercepted.

The Ecotourism Paradox or What is Ecotourism - and what is not?

I recently saw an advertisement for quadbike ecotourism, and honestly could not imagine how an experience with six or ten noisy quadbikes in a forest could be labelled 'ecotourism'.

Similarly, if one flies to an ecotourism destination, spends four to six hours each day in a vehicle observing wildlife, rushing from one animal sighting to the next after being notified over the radio, and later sits discussing that the experience whilst sipping expensive imported wine – one can only imagine the carbon footprint and environmental consequences of such activities!

It seems that the modern ecotourism landscape is increasingly dominated by luxury enterprises:- elegant lodges, boutique resorts, and nature-based retreats offering the comforts of premium hospitality, all in the name of ecotourism. Accommodations are often situated in remote, pristine environments, such as nature reserves, forests, or coastal regions. Facilities may include private lodges or

bungalows, gourmet organic cuisine, private wildlife excursions, and wellness offerings such as yoga and spa treatments.

Ecotourism aims to promote environmental conservation, yet often causes negative impacts such as habitat destruction or alteration, pollution, and social disruption. The evidence of human presence which alters animal behaviour is common, increasing their vulnerability and affecting their ability to evade predators or avoid poachers. These behavioural changes may lead to injuries, death, or displacement, disrupting ecosystems and threatening species survival.

Popular ecotourist destinations often lead to building new infrastructure for more visitors. Increased tourism puts pressure on local resources and the ecosystem. Socially it may displace indigenous groups or local communities from their land, preventing them from benefiting economically. Additionally, sacred rituals and cultural practices may be turned into spectacles for tourists, which is arguably simply exploitation of indigenous traditions for commercial gain.

A conservationist, Hector

Ceballos-Lascurain is credited with the first definition of ecotourism in 1987, "tourism that consists of travelling to relatively undisturbed or uncontaminated natural areas with the specific object of studying, admiring and enjoying the scenery and its wild plants and animals, as well as any existing cultural manifestations (both past and present) found in these areas." The International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) sees ecotourism as a significant tool for conservation, though it should not be seen as a fix-all when it comes to conservation challenges.

Sustainable ecotourism should be guided by three core principles: conservation, education, and community. Conservation is the key component of ecotourism because it offers long-term, sustainable solutions to enhancing and protecting biodiversity and nature. Marketing an ecosystem, species, or landscape to ecotourists helps create value, and that value can help raise funds to protect and conserve those natural resources.

The goal of ecotourism tours and companies must surely be to educate tourists about conservation efforts, offering them the chance to explore nature, while supporting local communities and conservation efforts. Yet beneath its green image often lies a more complex and often troubling reality:poorly managed ecotourism can inflict more harm than good, undermining the very ideals it seeks to uphold.

While ecotourism has the potential to foster environmental conservation and awareness, it is essential to recognise and address its negative impacts. Sustainable practices, strict regulations, and community involvement are crucial to ensuring that ecotourism fulfils its promise of protecting the environment and supporting local communities without causing harm. By understanding these challenges, participants can work towards a more responsible and effective approach to ecotourism.

As an industry that relies heavily on the presentation of ecofriendly components to attract customers, ecotourism has the inevitable potential as a means for greenwashing. Just as corporations may falsely brand themselves as environmentally friendly or socially responsible to appeal to conscious consumers, ecotourism companies often mask exploitative or unsustainable practices behind the veneer of conservation. Noble intentions often become distorted, and the 'eco' prefix amounts to little more than a greenwashing rebrand.

When planning your ecotourism trip, do research on the organisation to ensure they genuinely benefit the environment rather than exploit it. Certifications can help travellers identify responsible options. Thoroughly check the credentials, practices, and ethics of ecotourism operators to make sure your travel choices support conservation, help local communities, and minimise harm. However, if your operator's main goal is economic growth it cannot truly be "eco." Ecotourism should be seen as a conservation tool, not a means for unchecked commercial expansion.

FURTHER FRUSTRATION OVER INFORMAL DUNE DEVELOPMENT

Sedgefield residents living near the dunes behind "Onderstegaaitjie" in Smutsville have voiced rising fear and concern over the rapid proliferation of informal housing on these environmentally sensitive dunes.

The dunes, which run alongside Plumbago Road in the Sedgehill suburb and extend toward Mvoli Beach, are under severe threat from unchecked informal building, illegal vegetation clearing, and hazardous activities such as cable burning.

RHEENENDAL COMMUNITY TO BENEFIT FROM **MUNICIPAL INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS**

Ward 5 Councillor Hilton Stroebel and Knysna Executive Mayor Thando Matika informed Rheenendal residents of two significant infrastructure projects soon to be launched in the area. The upgrading of gravel roads and the Rheenendal bulk water supply, phase one, were announced at a well-attended public meeting held on 6 November. Both projects are funded through the Municipal Infrastructure Grant.

"The gravel roads upgrade project is valued at R12 million," said Matika. "Six gravel roads will be upgraded with concrete block paving. This will directly benefit 1,899 households by providing more durable and weather-resistant road surfaces and improving access and safety.'

A key feature of the project is its contribution to local economic empowerment, with 25% of the project value allocated to local Exempted Micro-Enterprises (EMEs) from the municipal supplier database. This allocation ensures that small businesses within the community will benefit directly from the work being undertaken.

"The Rheenendal bulk water supply upgrade, phase one, will strengthen the area's water infrastructure to ensure a reliable and sustainable supply to this community," he explained. "The

project, budgeted at just under R16.5 million, will benefit 2,352 households once completed."

Core components of the upgrade include improvements to the extraction weir on the Homtini River, refurbishment of the existing steel rising main, construction of a new raw water storage tank and the drilling of new boreholes. These interventions will increase the system's capacity to meet both current and future water demand.

"As with the road upgrade, 25% of the total project value will be allocated to local EMEs, supporting job creation and the growth of small-scale contractors within Rheenendal," Matika confirmed. "These projects are not only in line with our ongoing commitment to improving basic services, but also our commitment to creating local economic opportunities.'

Contractors appointed for the projects were also introduced to the community, ensuring transparency and encouraging collaboration from the outset. We look forward to working with these contractors, and the community of Rheenendal, as we prepare to uplift and develop the local community, its infrastructure and its economy," Matika concluded.

The alarm was first raised at community meeting held earlier this year with representatives from Knysna Municipality and attended by Ward Councillor

Levael Davis. Residents said they were deeply concerned at the pace and extent of informal structure development, which they said was destabilising the delicate fynbos and indigenous plant life that anchors the dunes in place.

Residents have since reported the frequent use of chainsaws to clear vegetation for shack construction and the daily burning of what they believe are stolen cables to extract copper, creating toxic smoke that affects nearby homes. The fire risk posed by these activities is significant, prompting calls for a firebreak to protect affected properties.

The stability of the dunes will also be compromised, potentially leading to erosion, flooding, and landslides in rainy seasons. Furthermore, they believe the proliferation of

"We are in no way opposed to development, we are however. for the right development that will be an asset to the already established homes in the area. Smutsville has grown exponentially and it is the lack of planning that is causing the issue," says resident Carlo Agostini, "Housing congestion will only add to the already strained infrastructure and allow negative elements to strive, not to mention property values to be negatively affected. The bigger

Smutsville is already bursting at the seems and the surrounding ecosystem is being gambled on with little to no consideration to fauna and flora, wildlife and security in the area. Common sense must prevail and boundaries need to be respected." The community has sent a formal to Knysna Municipality's Municipal Manager Lulamile Mapholoba to intervene and assist in curbing these developments. They are aware it is a complex challenge since the land is privately owned, limiting municipality enforcement powers, but while the municipality conducts inspections to prevent illegal water and electricity connections to informal structures, it has declined to erect protective fencing or provide utilities to these dwellings.

The Department of Forestry, Fisheries & Environment (DFFE) has also been informed and contacted regarding vegetation clearance, but response capabilities appear limited.

Residents are also deeply aware of the severe housing and residential land shortages in Smutsville, which drive much of the informal building. Over the years, many promises have been made by local, provincial and national authorities to address this shortage, yet progress remains slow, leaving vulnerable populations with few legal options for living space.

The community's plea is clear: urgent and collaborative efforts are needed to protect Sedgefield's natural heritage, reduce fire hazards, and find sustainable housing solutions for those in need. Preserving the unspoilt dunes is essential not just for ecological reasons but also for safeguarding the safety, health, and property of local residents. This ongoing issue highlights the

difficult balance between environmental protection and addressing critical social housing needs in the Knysna region. Without decisive action by all stakeholders, the dunes and the community's safety remain at grave risk.




Art lovers can also explore other ongoing exhibitions around Sedgefield. The Golem





DIABETES DOESN'T HOLIDAY

Few people, other than people with diabetes themselves, fully appreciate the psychological burden of living with diabetes type 1 or type 2 and the daily effort required for successfully managing such a serious condition over the long term.

"The alarming statistic that four out of five diabetics worldwide at some point experience 'diabetic burnout', struggling to manage their treatment, is very concerning. No one chooses diabetes, yet unless it is properly monitored and controlled, it can lead to immediate and lifelong health risks," says pharmacist Sameera Kumandan.

"Ahead of the holiday season, it is especially important to ensure a continuous supply of your oral or injectable diabetes medication and to keep to your routine to avoid some of the potential dangers and temptations that can easily distract you from keeping your blood glucose levels in the healthy range at this time of year."

Both very high and very low blood glucose levels can quickly become medical emergencies, she explains. "Diabetic ketoacidosis [DKA] happens when blood sugar levels become dangerously high, often caused by missed insulin doses or insufficient insulin in the body, and it may require hospitalisation. On the other hand, very low blood sugar levels, known as hypoglycaemia, can result in seizures, loss of consciousness, or even coma," she warns, adding "Sometimes patients are tempted to overcompensate with insulin and other medications when they know they haven't been adhering to their medication regimen or diet. This can be dangerous unless under a healthcare practitioner's guidance. It is not recommended at all as it can result in extremely altered glucose levels, causing severe damage to the body.'

"With any chronic or lifelong illness, we need to understand that maintaining a daily routine is crucial and helps to remove some of the stress of navigating life. With diabetes, disrupted treatment can potentially lead to extreme levels of either hyperglycaemia, causing damage to the body's organs, blood vessels and nerves.

"To help prevent irreversible harm to the eyes, kidneys, heart, nerves and vessels, monitoring and controlling blood glucose is essential all year round to avoid the extremes of high or low blood sugar that may even cause diabetic coma and, tragically, can sometimes be fatal," the pharmacist insists.

Glucometers, glucose testing strips, lancets, and insulin pumps help track and control blood sugar levels. Some glucometers automatically digitally record blood sugar readings. Also available are insulin pumps and sensors referred to as CGMs [continuous glucose monitors] to continuously monitor blood glucose levels and administer the correct amount of insulin, without the person having to check their blood sugar and inject themselves.

"Pharmacists are here to support our patients, so they don't have to ever feel alone on their diabetes journey. Diabetes is a lifelong illness that does not take a holiday, so if you have diabetes, please continue with your medication, monitoring glucose levels, watch your diet over the festive season and eat treats in moderation, choosing healthier alternatives wherever possible," Kumandan says.

"If you are travelling, remember to pack enough medication and keep a copy of your prescription and pictures of your medication on your phone in case you either forget or lose your medication."



KADC: A Lifeline Facing Financial Challenges

For nearly three decades, the Knysna Alcohol and Drug Centre (KADC) has been a beacon of hope for communities in the Greater Knysna and Bitou Municipal

Since its inception, KADC has been at the forefront of combating the devastating impact of substance abuse by providing lifesaving services, including prevention awareness programs, early intervention, and aftercare support. Its mission is clear: to create substance abuse-free communities where individuals can regain dignity, freedom, and the ability to contribute positively to society.

The Centre's core services include community engagement through awareness programs, early identification and support for individuals at the onset of substance use, and robust reintegration and aftercare programs that assist recovering individuals with their return to society. These services remain

critical as the crisis of substance abuse escalates in the region.

However, KADC now faces considerable financial challenges. The funding currently received from the Western Cape Department of Social Development covers only postfunding social worker salaries, leaving operational costs such as staff salaries and monthly expenses uncovered.

In response to these challenges, the KADC Board and staff have launched numerous fundraising initiatives, including the "Back a Buddy" donation campaign, community events such as Chicken Braai and Boerewors sales, and an art evening featuring local and international artist Stanley Grootboom. Upcoming events are planned to further raise vital funds.

The centre appeals urgently for

financial support to bridge its current funding shortfalls, with donation options ranging from R500 to R2,500. All donations are vital to sustaining the Centre's life-changing work and ensuring that no individual or family battling addiction in the Greater Knysna and Plettenberg Bay area is left without help.

Transparency is a cornerstone of KADC's operations, with detailed annual reports available to donors, underscoring the responsible use of every contribution.

In these challenging times, the Knysna Alcohol and Drug Centre remains an essential lifeline for vulnerable community members. Continued financial support is critical to sustaining its mission and helping those affected by addiction rebuild their lives and futures.

The Wine Ghost tasted -Cathedral Cellar Chardonnay 2023

It is an interesting use of a dark glass bottle for a white wine. The slightly different front label depicts the inside of a wine cellar, in gold. There is no definite back label. The front label wraps about two thirds of the way around the bottle, offering a bit of history, as well as tasting notes. Abv. 13.5%

The wine has a dark straw colour and only a few legs were visible.

No flaws were found on the nose. Aromas of orange peel and lime carry through to the tasting. It is a well balanced chardonnay, with a hint of oak in the background.

The wine has a medium length mouth feel, with the lingering flavours of orange and lemon.



The WG thinks it will work well with a platter, containing cheese, white meat and calamari strips.

This chardonnay can be aged for a few years, or simply enjoyed now. Price range: R100-R120.
